# Meeting Minutes Tuesday, September 27, 2022 10:30am – 12:00pm

## Action:

## II. VPDUE Frey's Report – 10:35am – 10:55am

A. Course barrier data

At the September 13, 2022 UGC meeting, VPDUE Frey shared data about the impact of prerequisite and other course management barriers on students and staff. Today, VPDUE Frey will continue the discussion and answer any questions.

VPDUE Frey further discussed the existing barriers related to student registration and the high number of overrides being given for certain courses. Several courses are currently being offered to first-year students at UC Merced; however, data reveals that several overrides are given to allow second-, third-, and fourth-year students to enroll in these courses. All transfer students must receive an override for the courses they have completed at their prior institution, as well. VPDUE Frey clarified that the proposal is not to eliminate prerequisites altogether, but rather to be mindful of which barriers are used and if they are truly necessary.

A member recommended a mechanism for alerting faculty when a certain threshold is met for the number of overrides given for a particular course. If instructors are notified when this threshold is met for their course, they would be given the opportunity to reexamine the prerequisites and modify the course proposal. VPDUE Frey's next step is to consult with Department Chairs, and she welcomed a draft memo from UGC to include with her correspondence.

### Action:

VPDUE Frey invited UGC to include a memo with her correspondence to Department Chairs conveying their support for alerting faculty when a high number of overrides are given for a particular course.

# B. Laptop Policy

VPDUE Frey would like to propose a campus-wide adoption of a laptop policy modeled after that of the School of Engineering's policy.

# **SoE Laptop Policy**

In order to support student success, the School of Engineering (SOE) is communicating minimum hardware specifications for student laptops effective August 2019. Procurement of a computer that meets these specifications will improve a student's success by facilitating connectivity to the University's network, which enables the execution of tasks assigned in most engineering classes, thereby cultivating the skill development necessary for acclimation into today's workplace.

# **VPDUE Frey's proposal for policy and implementation:**

- All UC Merced undergraduate students are required to have a personal laptop computer. This laptop must meet university designated minimum specifications [LINK to site which will be updated annually with appropriate specifications]. Students may be required by instructors to utilize a laptop in class.
- Beginning Fall 2023, all incoming freshmen and transfer students are required to have a laptop. This will continue to roll out to incoming students each year.

**Requested Action**: Members are to engage in discussion and determine whether a campus-wide laptop policy should be established and what constituencies should be consulted prior to policy development.

VPDUE Frey shared her proposal for a mandatory campus-wide laptop policy, which would be included in students' financial aid packages. Instructors could then assume that students have access to a device that they could bring to class, and it would also create a more equitable environment for students to complete their homework. Not many computer labs are currently available to students after hours to complete their homework. Instructors have also adopted more digital technologies following the pandemic. The Division of Undergraduate Education would continue to maintain their laptop loaner program, which would provide a short-term solution to students who are facing issues with their personal laptop.

The intent would be to adopt the minimum technical specifications that the School of Engineering has created. UC Merced would not allow Chromebooks because they do not meet software needs. The Office of Information Technology (OIT) would also be consulted regarding a cloud computing system so that students would not have to download specific software onto their personal laptops.

A member pointed out that the new Apple computers are fundamentally different from older models and carry new processors, which makes them incompatible with many software programs. A recommendation was made to use Software-as-a-Service (SaaS) or Containers-as-a-Service (CaaS), which would provide students with access to software applications via the internet rather than having to download it directly to their laptop. VPDUE Frey recommended that the campus bookstore sell a base model to students at a discounted price by purchasing in bulk, and UGC should revisit this each year to ensure that the most up-to-date high functioning base models are available to students.

A member noted the importance of OIT's involvement in the implementation of this proposal. The Computer Science and Engineering (CSE) Department does not have a system in place to provide students with the proper tools to complete various assignments. Many instructors and TAs are currently providing IT support to students during one-on-one sessions to ensure they have the proper virtual environment for completing their assignments. The current lockdown browsers issue has also not been resolved. VPDUE Frey clarified that UC Merced OIT has been extensively consulted about this policy and their role in supporting students' laptop devices. The first step is to implement the policy, and then further discussions will occur with OIT regarding specifications.

A member inquired about the plan for resolving the issue of the impacted computer labs on campus, especially with enrollment growth. VPDUE Frey clarified that the implementation of the campus-wide laptop policy is not intended to dictate the pedagogy of a class or the use of computer labs, but rather to meet traditional laptop needs. The issue of impacted computer labs remains and will need to be addressed.

## Lead Reviewer: Eileen Camfield

Member Camfield solicited comments from the Writing Studies faculty. Associate Director of the Merritt Writing Program (MWP) Samantha Ocena provided comments, available <u>here</u>. A deadline of October 7, 2022 was given for all Writing Studies faculty to provide their feedback, and UGC Analyst will share all comments with UGC.

UGC Member and UCOPE Representative Francois Blanchette also provided comments, available <u>here</u>.

**Requested Action:** UGC to discuss lead reviewer's comments and associated comments. UGC Analyst will share with members any additional comments received from the Writing Studies faculty.

Deadline: Thursday, October 13, 2022.

Member Camfield reported that the Analytical Placement Writing Exam (AWPE) has been discontinued, and several questions regarding access and equity have arisen. Members of the Task Force have reviewed how the Entry Level Writing Requirement (ELWR) is delivered systemwide across the nine campuses (UCSF being the tenth campus that is not included), as well as reviewed alternate writing placement processes since the timed AWPE is no longer an

option. Member Camfield noted that members of the Task Force Report are seeking specific feedback from each Division on the Phase 2 - Placement Principles (pages 10-13) and Recommendations (pages 13-16), as well as proposed revisions to SR 636 - University of California Entry Level Writing Requirement (pages 16 - 18).

Member Camfield also reported on the current systemwide discussions regarding a systemwide subcommittee of the University Committee on Preparatory Education (UCOPE), which would be comprised of members dedicated to reviewing questions of equity and access in entry level writing and placement. Furthermore, there is a recommendation for each campus to develop local placement protocols and procedures, which is currently being piloted at UC Merced.

A member inquired about the potential issues with the current writing placement tools in regard to classroom pedagogy. Member Camfield believes there should be better alignment. The writing and reading samples were proposed by the Merritt Writing Program (MWP), and based on surveys, the most common forms of writing assignments and typical readings found in WRI 001 are used at UC Merced. The idea is that these writing placement tools would help prepare students for their writing classes. UGC previously approved a pilot of the directed self-placement and the Task Force, which includes representation from the MWP instructors and administrators/directors. Member Camfield is happy to share the tool and preliminary data with UGC.

# V. Consultation with SNS Dean Dumont and Dr. Margo Vener – 11:35am – 11:55am A. Progress in Medical Education

Dean Dumont and Dr. Vener provided an update on Medical Education. Dean Dumont shared the Baccalaureate Workstream Report and core competencies, available in our shared UGC AY 22-23 box folder <u>here</u>.

The overarching goal is to enhance and customize the undergraduate educational experience that UC Merced currently offers. There is a set of courses that UCSF has identified as good preparation courses for medical students. She reported that 12 students have been provisionally accepted to UCSF School of Medicine and will begin in Fall 2023.

The workstream group has focused on articulating the core competencies, which are listed <u>here (page 3)</u>. Dean Dumont reported that the competencies are broad concepts because they map to UCSF's graduation milestones for medical students. Dean Dumont's and Dr. Vener's goal moving forward is to share this list of competencies with faculty who are currently teaching Med Ed Core (collection of courses that are contained within the Bioengineering major, the Human Biology, Molecular and Cell Biology, and Developmental Biology tracks of the Biology major and the Biological Chemistry track within the Chemistry major).

A member wondered whether the medical Spanish course has been considered as one of the competencies. Dean Dumont clarified that the Spanish course is not listed as a requirement but is available for students to take.
